Program Description	Program Objectives This program is designed for overseas students who are interested in both Chinese language learning and vocational training in Taiwan's industry-academia cooperation system. The objective is to cultivate students with strong Chinese language proficiency professional skills, and practical work experience to enhance their future career development and employability. The curriculum is divided into three major areas: 1. Chinese Language Courses – Strengthening students' listening, speaking, reading, and writing abilities. 2. General, Professional, and Internship Courses – Covering basic academic subjects, vocational training, and fieldwork. 3. Industry Internship – Providing hands-on work opportunities in cooperation with enterprises, enabling students to gain real-world experience.

Mandarin courses (online or on-campus courses)	 First Academic Year (Fall & Spring Semesters): Each semester includes a 3-cred 6-hour Chinese Language course and a 2-credit, 4-hour Chinese Language Prociency Test course. The course content will be adjusted according to students' proficient levels to provide suitable Chinese learning support. Second Academic Year (Fall & Spring Semesters): Each semester offers a 3-cred 3-hour Advanced Chinese Conversation course designed to further develop student oral communication skills. Additional Support: The university's Chinese Language Center provides consultations with Chinese language instructors and arranges local student learning partners to assist international students in both academic learning and daily life adaptation.

Further Education After Graduation	1. Upon graduation, students are eligible to pursue further studies in tourism-related master's programs at leading universities. Options include the Master's Program in Tourism and Hospitality Management at National Kaohsiung University of Science and Technology, as well as the Master's Programs in Tourism Studies and in Hospitality Management at National Kaohsiung University of Hospitality and Tourism. 2. Graduates may also continue their academic journey at our own university by applying to the Master's Program in Sport and Leisure Management or the Master's Program in Business Administration.			
Scholarships and Financial Aids	 The OCAC provides the following grants and subsidies: The first two years of tuition grant: each new student will be granted TWD 20,000 per semester during the first two academic years. (The tuition grant for national universities has been applied to actual charges, with a maximum limit of TWD 20,000) Excellent Conduct and Academic Performance Scholarship: Available for those with excellent academic performance. Those who have obtained certificates and competition awards will be awarded TWD 6,000 per person per academic year. Medical Insurance for Overseas Compatriot Students (6 months): A total of TWD 600 will be subsidized (before students enroll in National Health Insurance). Healthcare: Every student is required to enroll in National Health Insurance and pay the insurance premiums. Students who have proof of economic hardship (or financial difficulty document) are subsidized 50 % of the insurance premiums. (Current monthly subsidy is TWD 413). Work-study subsidy and economic hardship scholarship: TWD 2,500 per month for students who are offered work-study opportunities. Emergency Aid: Provided on a case-by-case basis. Scholarship and subsidies provided by the University: Full waiver of dormitory fees for the first academic year. From the second academic year onward, students whose academic and conduct scores in the previous semester are both 80 or above may receive a 50% reduction

Dormitory Fee Information:

Dormitory fees are charged by semester and do not include utility fees, deposit, or vacation housing fees. The actual fees are as follows:

Deposit: TWD 200 per student (fully refundable upon move-out if no damage is found).

Dormitory Committee Fee: TWD 100 per student per semester (used for maintenance and dormitory activities; mandatory).

Winter/Summer Vacation Housing:

Students who wish to stay during winter or summer vacations must apply separately and pay according to the relevant regulations.
